



Citing Web Sites and Web Pages MLA Format

Citing an entire website

Include as many of the following items that are available on the website:

- The name of the editor of the site (last name, first name).
- The title of the site in italics.
- The name of any sponsoring organization (if no sponsor, use N.p. for “no publisher”).
- The date of publication or last update (if no date is available, use n.d. for “no date”).
- The medium (Web).
- The date you accessed the website.

Citing a page or short work from a website

Include as many of the following elements as apply and as are available:

- The author's name (last name, first name).
- The title of the short work in quotation marks.
- The title of the site in italics.
- The sponsor of the site, if not named as the author or given as the title of the site (if no sponsor, use “N.p.” for “No publisher”).
- The date of publication or last update (if no date is available, use n.d. for “no date”).
- The medium (Web).
- The date you accessed the source.
